'Achieving Climate and Racial Justice - Is Citizenship Education the key?'

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The 2021 Five Nations Network conference will discuss two key political movements - for racial justice and the environment. Both have risen up the political agenda around the world and both have featured young people in leadership roles. Together we will consider:

- The background knowledge required to understand the issues and to build our understanding of climate change and racial injustice, and how they relate to each other.
- The debates within (and beyond) the movements about the causes, consequences and likely solutions.
- Political debates about the range of citizenship activity (from party politics and institutional policy development to international activism) and how to evaluate what works, what might be counterproductive, and what we, as individuals, might do about it.
- What this means for moving Citizenship education forward across the five nations.

The conference aims to:

- bring together teachers, practitioners and other stakeholders from across the five
 nations so that we can learn from one another about developing high quality citizenship
 education that responds to our distinctive contexts
- discuss the role of citizenship teachers in responding to the current political issues, particularly those where young people occupy prominent roles
- review how teachers can make connections between these contemporary issues and thus connect to the broader curriculum for citizenship education
- explore different teaching approaches that help students to develop informed opinions about these urgent issues
- consider the opportunities and challenges in nurturing young people's political agency,
 especially making informed decisions about what types of citizen action are appropriate
- encourage new thinking and learning about citizenship education, teaching and practice and promote dialogue and collaboration across the five nations.

Moving forward: Black Asian and Minority Ethnic Perspectives in the new curriculum in Wales

In November of 2021 the Welsh government took the historic step of making mandatory the teaching of Black, Asian and Minority perspectives in the curriculum. This makes Wales the leading nation in the UK to take this step. The preparation for the roll out of the new curriculum is well underway, with primary schools in Wales adopting it from September this year and secondary schools to follow in 2023. How did this come about? What key drivers made the Welsh government take this step? Nevertheless, there remains a number of questions pertinent to the role of citizenship education in advancing this ambition. What exactly will mandatory mean in this context? How can we ensure the momentum is sustained? And what models might characterise how schools engage with this thematic?
